



Gallery fighting 'no fine art' stigma

Ten years ago, holding an art show in the Southwest Valley would be as likely as having a summer snowball fight. But times they are a-changin,' which makes John Clay happy.

Clay, who owns the John Clay Gallery in Litchfield Park, is hosting an art reception next week for a new exhibit called "The Four Radicals, Plus One. The show features four Arizona artists. Clay will be displaying some of his own art. "I'm the 'plus one,'" he said, laughing.

Clay opened his gallery three years ago. "I was the first fine-art gallery in the West Valley," he said. "But we're always fighting this stigma that you can't find fine art out here. Jean Klafs founded the Four Radicals about 21/2 years ago "to rebel against the rules."

Griffith came to the Valley seven years ago from New Mexico and settled in Avon-



WHERE YOUNG ARTISTS MEET CONTEMPORARY MASTERS

At the Santa Fe Institute of Fine Art, small groups of advanced students work with outstanding professionals.

By Suzanne Deats

The concept is at least as old as medieval apprenticeship: an artist, already very skilled and experienced, seeks out a master to work with, at least for a short time. It is a deepening of vision for the mature artist. For the master, it is a rejuvenation of purpose. It is an opportunity to give currency not to a style, but to ideas about art itself that

have taken a lifetime to develop.

This fundamental concept is too easily forgotten in the sophisticated world of contemporary art where everyone is famous for fifteen minutes. But in this overheated situation, it is crucial as never before that the sequence of art history must not be derailed by the juggernaut of commerce. More is at stake here than a simple polishing of existing skills, which is the province of the classroom. The continuity of art itself is on the

in their own discipline, much as performing artists have done for years.

Santa Fe is privileged to be host to the only successful organization of this type. It took root here in 1985 and has flourished in this environment of clear light, strong design traditions and creative camaraderie.

The Santa Fe Institute of Fine Art was the brainchild of Bill Lumpkins and the late Pony Ault. They established a provisional committee and set about formulating a statement of purpose and a plan of action. One of their first and, by all accounts, best moves was to recruit Bobbie Thomas, then Vice President of Manhattanville College in Purchase, New York, as director. Thomas and her husband had spent time in Santa Fe each year for many years, and knew it well. Ault and Lumpkins had a great concept, and it fell to Thomas to convert it to reality.

A board of trustees was set up to run everything. These trustees have been generous to a fault, even coming in to help move easels when the Institute changed quarters. There is a separate committee that helps choose the masters that are to come. Another committee, working independently of each other for maximum objectivity, goes over the portfolios of applicants, choosing about

twenty to send to the master. The master artist does the final selection, again without knowing the names of the applicants. Only Helen Frankenthaler and Richard Diebenkorn, so far, like to walk in not knowing anything about the people they will be working with.

The Institute started on the proverbial shoestring, determined not to go under like so much else in Santa Fe. It opened in December 1985 with Richard Diebenkorn in a studio at Sanbusco, soon moving to Plaza Mercado on West San Francisco. Diebenkorn was followed by such great names as Helen Frankenthaler, Wayne Thiebaud, Nancy Graves, Fritz Scholder, Larry Bell, Wolf Kahn, Rudy Autio, Paul Jenkins, Gregory Gillespie, Nathan Oliveira, and Beverly Pepper. Recently, Hanriette Wyeth and her son Michael Hurd shared a session, with Wyeth teaching portrait painting in the mornings and Hurd taking to the field in the afternoon to teach watercolor. Ken Tyler is coming to do a graphics workshop this summer. Each year, the Institute plans to bring in a different visual discipline, such as design in different fields-architecture, stage design, etc.

"Our next big push is scholarship money,

because we don't want this to be just for the affluent," explains Thomas. "Students have ranged in age from 18 to 72. If there is a very fine student, we make it possible for them to come."

There has been a problem with the term "masters," because it has nothing to do with a conventional M.F.A., which is one of its more exciting aspects. However, for the ones who are actually in college, Bobbie Thomas will communicate with their professors after the session. "I validate the number of hours they have worked with which master, and they always do get credit, which they work out with the individual college. As Nate Oliveira said, 'They can get credit anywhere. What you're giving them is something they could never get anywhere else.'"

The school will soon be moving to more convenient quarters on Second Street. There, in two large two-story spaces, the Institute will have room to spread out, plus access to parking and inexpensive restaurants. "It's REALLY going to be a beautiful studio!" exclaims Thomas, who is working with Bill Lumpkins on the remodelling of the space.

The Institute provides each master with a separate, smaller studio in which to work

alone. "We'll do anything the masters want," Thomas says. "We tell them, 'When you agree to come, you run the show. We don't tell you what to do because we don't have the right. All we ask is that when you come in the first day, you sit with the students and tell them how you're going to do it, so they're clear on what hours you're going to teach and what days you'll be here.' There's a minimum requirement, of course, but we find that they work too much, rather than not enough. Every artist is entirely different from all the others.

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"I ask each master to come in at the end of their session and critique what we're doing. Are we doing it the way they think it should be done? Are we taking the right kind of students? Are they good enough students? How about the space?"

Thus the Institute changes in response to its ongoing concerns. After all, as Thomas reminds us, "The reason this whole thing started was because a group of individuals in town knew that Santa Fe was an art capital, and that Santa Fe needed this type of art school. They also felt that the art capital validation was mainly on the number of galleries. They felt that the older, more Western stuff, lovely though it is, should be offset, that we should become more contemporary. They thought Santa Fe was the place to have an art school, but not just any art school. They wanted to do something different, to go back to the European theory of the masters working with the proteges.

When we first opened, people looked at us like, 'What are you doing bringing these famous people here?' But the town appreciated us. We're trying to bring people from other parts of the country to absorb the important things we have here, and also to help the young artists who are living here to meet these great artists. We go back to New York now and Nancy Graves is telling everybody about Santa Fe-in a GOOD way, not just to bring tourists here. It's about how beautiful Santa Fe is, and how wonderful to give it to the rest of the world on a canvas.

"We have had two offers to move this place, lock, stock and barrel-one to the East Coast and one to the West Coast. We told them if we had wanted to do it there, we would have done it there to start with. We all love Santa Fe, and that's why we did it here."





We break the rules," Klafs said. The rules of the art world, that is.

"We have been in many shows and workshops and studied a lot, and we just like to be creative without the rules," Klafs said.

Beginning Dec. 3, Klafs and her four painting

friends, will show a collection of original art at The Park Gallery in Litchfield Park

The show is called The Four Radicals Plus One, and I am the plus one," gallery owner and artist John Clay said. "There will be original art for sale and it is open to the public.

The painters showing their work in the show, which runs through Jan. 7, are Klafs, Clay, Hank Keneally, Sue Kennedy and Deloris Griffith.

Klafs played a role in bringing the group together, and it was all about acrylic work.
"We organized about three years ago. When

I moved here, they were all painting watercolor and I painted in acrylic. You might see one acrylic painting and the rest were all water color. This went on for years, and I decided to do something about it, so I got the four of us together and we paint with acrylic," Klafs said.

Klafs, originally from Indianapolis, graduated with honors in painting from Chouinard's Arts Institute, now the Cal Arts Institute. She moved

to Arizona in 1980.

"I didn't have an education until I really moved to Newport Beach, California, and I got a scholarship for four years at Chouinard Art Institute. Then I opened my own interior design shop for 26 years," Klafs said.

She has been an artist since she was a child. "I started when I was in the fifth grade. I didn't have any paints, I just had charcoal, and they sent me to Indianapolis to go and sketch at the museums, sketch the big sculptures," Klafs said.

Now her abstract paintings depict many of her travels.

"I paint subject matter but I don't use it as my guide. It is just something to start with and then abstract. I paint my travels and I am very interested in color. I have been painting now my landscapes from around the world," Klafs said.

Klafs has visited Italy, Yugoslavia, France, Japan, Israel, Honduras, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Mexico, China, Russia and Egypt.

Her paintings may take a lifetime to complete, Klafs said.

"It takes as long as I live [to finish a painting]. You use what you know, and you know what you don't know. I might paint a painting one year, and then paint on it again another year," Klafs said, adding, "I am slow at finishing, and I just go to some other subject or some other thought."

The artists will each have 10 to 12 paintings showing at the gallery, and original artwork for

The Park Gallery is at 118 N. Litchfield Road, and is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, from noon to 4 p.m. Saturdays and it is closed Sundays.
